## The Timeline of Change and New







**Sister Anne Wambach**, a native of Philadelphia, is the daughter of Isabel Thompson Wambach and the late Michael Wambach, Sr. She began her journey in religious life in 1978 when she entered the congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Chestnut Hill, PA. In 1992 Sister Anne moved to Mount Saint Benedict Monastery in Erie to respond to a desire to experience the monastic way of life. In 1997 she made her monastic profession as a Benedictine Sister of Erie. From 2006-2010, she served on the Monastic Council.

Sister Anne holds a B.S. in elementary education and an M.A. in church music in liturgy. She has ministered in the teaching profession as teacher and principal and in church music ministry as oboist, pianist and vocalist. At the time of her election, Sister Anne was serving at the Inner-City Neighborhood Art House, both as program and executive director.

#### **May 31**

The Church calendar celebrates the Visitation of Mary on May 31. It is the Christian feast day that commemorates the visit of two holy women, both pregnant and soon to be mothers. Mary and Elizabeth share a special moment of grace and blessing, rejoicing with one another, standing in awe of the goodness of God. Everything in this event is filled with action and excitement, with change and stability. Never again would these women be the same; always would they be blessed because of their belief that the promise of God would be fulfilled.

In this year of 2010, May 31 became a memorable day for the Benedictine Sisters of Erie. After a weekend of discernment and prayer, conversation and listening, on a feast day of women celebrating women, a community of women reached out in joy and in support to embrace Sister Anne Wambach as the new prioress-elect.

#### June 13

As specified in Call to Life, the approved constitutions of the Federation of Saint Scholastica, the Monastic Council serves as "an advisory board to the prioress." In addition to this, the monastic norms for the Benedictine Sisters of Erie state that the council will consist of five members. Two members of the council are elected by the community and three members are appointed. On June 13, after engaging in a discernment process, the

community elected Sisters Mary Lou Kownacki and Charlotte Anne Zalot to the Monastic Council. Following this, Sister Anne appointed the additional three members. They include: Sisters Annette Marshall, Diane Cook and Susan Doubet (sub-prioress).

#### **July 11**

A beautiful Sunday afternoon marked the feast of Benedict and the installation of the new prioress and council. The community provided the occasion, the chapel was the setting, the guests added to the excitement; the ritual made it memorable and a reception concluded the celebration.



# Beginnings, Faithfulness and Stability

Hearts overflowed with joy and love as outgoing prioress, Sister Christine Vladimiroff, called forth prioress-elect, Sister Anne Wambach, to accept the office of prioress. After being affirmed, supported and blessed by the community Sister Anne then called forth the members of the Monastic Council



to confirm their willingness to act as her advisors. At the completion of the ceremony the sisters and their guests gathered in the community and dining rooms for a lovely reception where good food and pleasant company were enjoyed by all.

It was a day of change, a day of beginnings. The threshold into a new administration had been crossed. Like most new beginnings, it was an exciting one. Something ended and something began. At this juncture, as Sister Christine said so well in the spring issue of *The Mount*: "We continue to live in interesting times which are full of potential and possibilities and challenges and limitations." As a community we embrace the changes that are happening while we remain rooted in monastic

stability. Benedict suggests that being rooted in Christ and the Gospel feeds the stability of heart that is so necessary when we are faced with change. It is our desire to stand tall as autumn trees. Whether vibrant with color or empty of leaves, our roots are strong and deep. We look forward to the possibility that is ours in this new beginning because we believe there is life in movement and potential in change.

## The Rite of Installation

July 11, Feast of St. Benedict, founder of western monasticism, is the traditional date for the transferal of the authority of the office of prioress to the prioress-elect through the Rite of Installation. The transfer of authority is effected in this ritual when Sister Christine, prioress, asks for and receives Sister Anne's acceptance of the office of prioress.

The ceremony opens with the solemn procession of the professed monastic community into the monastery chapel. This rite of gathering and processing to the place of worship is known as the monastic statio. It symbolizes the life long journey to God, taken, not in isolation, but together as a monastic community.

The ritual symbolizes the rich biblical tradition of the covenant relationship of God with the Israelites (Lev. 26:12) and that mutuality of leadership in the monastic community to which the prioress-elect is called. The solemnity of the moment is captured in the dialogue between the prioress, prioress-elect, and the monastic community.

Sister Anne is called forward by Sister Christine and asked if she will accept the office of prioress, the visible sign of Christ's presence in the community. With the grace of God and the support of the monastic community, Sister Anne accepts the leadership of the community in its search for God according to the Gospel and the Rule of Benedict.

The covenant relationship between the monastic community and Sister Anne, prioress, is further demonstrated when Sister Anne asks the monastic community if they will continue to seek God in cenobitic community in a life lived according to the Gospel and the Rule of Benedict.

The community's affirmation is expressed in prayer and with a blessing of the newly installed prioress. Each Sister greets the new prioress and receives from her some particular symbol of the covenant just exchanged in the ritual.

The prioress invites those who will serve as her advisors as members of the Monastic Council to come forward. Each in turn is asked if she will accept the responsibility to advise the prioress in guiding the community in its journey to God through a life lived according to the Gospel and the Rule of Benedict.

Integral to the public observance of the prioress's installation is the call to the oblates and guests of the monastery who are in attendance to publicly state their promise to join the prioress and monastic community in its commitment to the Gospel and the Rule of Benedict in the Oblate Way of Life and in making known the presence of God's mercy and compassion in the Church and the world.

citizens working to reclaim and renew a deteriorating central-city neighborhood, specifically a square four block area that includes East 22nd and East 23rd Streets from Reed to Ash. Sisters Mary Lou Kownacki, Mary Miller, Anne McCarthy and Mary Ellen Plumb, three of them TSF Board members and all of them presently residing in the

neighborhood, recently received a grant from the Erie Community Foundation that will help a dream come true: an Inner-City Poetry Park. The Poetry Park will provide a beautiful and safe gathering space for creative programs in poetry and music as well as a place for neighbors to celebrate, rest or play. Sister Mary Lou explains: "In that garden, we will plant -- on artistic fences and flowers and paths -- words of beauty like 'Hold fast to dreams' and 'Life has loveliness to sell.' These will be words that children and adults can read and print on their hearts. Words that can sustain them in dark times. Words that bring them closer to God's intent for human beings."

As a result of having held administrative posts at institutions including Villa Maria Academy, Saint Benedict Academy and Saint Gregory School, North East, Sister Annette brings a wealth of administrative and educational experience to her new position. "The Inner-City Neighborhood Art House plays an important role in the city of Erie," Sister Annette says. "I look forward to continuing the strength and purpose of this very meaningful ministry with energy and excitement."



#### **AIM USA**

The Board of Trustees of AIM USA has appointed Stephanie Schmidt, OSB, as the new executive director of the secretariat, a position that had been held by Susan Doubet, OSB. Most recently Sister Stephanie has served as Executive Director of House of Healing in Erie, a residential program for women, and alternative to prison, where they can reside with their children.

A re-coating of the deck/roof so it can survive another harsh winter and prevent floods.

**New flooring** in the hallways and community and dining rooms of Mount St. Benedict, home to many of the Sisters.

Financial support for the operating budget to help with the basics of life: electricity, health insurance, food and transportation.

The projects, programs, services and needs mentioned are some of the things that your gifts subsidize. Perhaps you are familiar with the adage: "The power of giving can change a person's life."
